Puppy Carers teach basic obedience, house manners, eating and toileting on command, socialisation in many different places (restaurants, cinemas, cafes, shopping centres, supermarkets etc) and to walk on lead in a relaxed manner. What is the NCCD? All schools in Australia participate in The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with a Disability which is an annual collection that counts the number of school students receiving an adjustment due to a disability, and the level of adjustment they are receiving, to access education on the

adjustments to support their participation in education.

What are the benefits of the national data collection for my child? The aim of the national data collection is to collect quality information about Australian school students receiving adjustments due to disability. This information will help teachers, principals, education authorities and governments to better support students with a disability to take part in school on the

same basis as other students. The national data collection provides an opportunity for schools to review their learning and support systems and processes to

Protecting the privacy and confidentiality of all students and their families is essential and is an explicit focus of the national data collection. Data is collected within each school and personal details, such as student names or other identifying information, is not provided to local or federal education authorities.

Each of the included students have been identified by a school team as receiving a reasonable adjustment to address a disability under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (the Act) (www.legislation.gov.au/Details/C2017C00339). From 2018 the Student with a Disability Loading, provided by the Australian Government, is based on the national data collection. Funding is being provided to meet the learning needs of students receiving educational
